One word comes to mind when I think of my life recently—change. To say that my life has changed within the past year would be an understatement.

I was finishing up my career as an undergraduate at the University of Alabama, had the greatest girl a guy could ask for, and worked full-time in retail to pay my way through school. A few weeks before graduation, I sat down and took a breath, and thought. My eves were opened to how blessed I was to go through the hardships in my life. So I started to reach for the stars and took the first step. I looked at my life, learned not to be afraid, learned to seek change rather than cower from it, and learned to be brave and bold.

Sigma Tau Gamma is an organization I have come to know and love which has seen similar struggles. This spring we rolled out the new national website, one of the largest sites of any Greek organization. The Fraternity needed a place where any member, family, or friend could find anything and everything, and sigtau.org offers this. TOP SIG TAU HIGHLIGHTS



CHAPTERBUILDER.COM

Sigma Tau Gamma is the second national fraternity to offer the chapterbuilder.com service to every chapter and associate chapter free of charge. The online system allows each undergraduate member of the chapter to add names, track new member information, send reminder text messages, and track potential pledges' interest in joining the Fraternity. We have been piloting this software for two academic years. Those chapters that invested time and energy into adopting the software saw a noticeable increase in the number of new members who accepted bids.



SAGA MONTHLY DEBUTED

On September 1, the new SAGA Monthly was sent to all members, associate members, and campus fraternity and sorority advisors. The new format gives us more space to tell our story and share photos. This newsletter replaces the Monthly Chronicle but not the magazine. The concept is similar to that of large media companies like Time, Inc., which has its magazine, a daily newsletter, a weekly recap newsletter, and blog, all with the name Time at the top.



NEW FRATERNITY AND CHAPTER FLAG INTRODUCED

Our flag has a refreshed look that is familiar except for two significant changes. The light blue color has been replaced with the dark blue to be consistent with the fraternity's official colors. For chapters, a version of the flag was introduced with their respective chapter's Greek designation inside the chain. In the future, newly chartered chapters will be presented with their flag at their chartering ceremony to keep on campus. FOUNDATION RECEIVES CORPORATE MATCHING FUNDS

This past fall the Foundation received a \$10,000 corporate matching gift from the Stanley company. 

MANSFIELD, GAMMA ALPHA **CHAPTER CLOSED**

On January 3, the Board of Directors provided authorization to pursue closure of the chapter when appropriate. HQ Staff then furthered conversations with the alumni association to reconcile past debt and to secure with the university a return date. On January 25, after securing confirmation of a return date to Mansfield, Director of Collegiate Services, **Erik Kahl**, hosted a call with the undergraduate members to inform them of the decision to close the chapter and move current members to an alumni status. This is a result of chapter debt and membership attrition. Erik also shared our plan to return to campus, what it means to be a closed chapter, and why functions that could be associated with an active chapter must stop. While it is never an easy conversation to have, the men were not surprised and mostly receptive to the news, as well as relieved to know that we would be returning in the future.



CROWDCHANGE RESOURCE ADDED

In the summer of 2017, we will roll out a new fundraising platform to assist chapters with their philanthropic efforts. The new platform is called CrowdChange and operates similarly to GoFundMe but is exclusively for Greek organizations and nonprofits. Chapters can create as many fundraisers as they would like and set it up chapter-wide or as individuals with their unique pages/goals. We have had a few chapters piloting it and they have found it successful. The platform also allows us to better track and monitor dollars raised by our chapters. Eventually, we hope to connect chapter endowments to the page as well as increase traffic and functionality.



RITUAL BOOKS

New Ritual Books were printed and distributed to chapters that attended Webb Academy. This new book encompasses all ceremonies and rituals of Sigma Tau Gamma that take place on a chapter level. It is bound with a metal wire comb for durability and features a faux leather front and back cover with the new seal of the fraternity debossed on the cover. The books are numbered starting with 001, ensuring that HQ knows which copies have been given to each chapter. Each chapter received six copies, with a seventh copy going to the chapter's lead advisor. Books will be distributed to lead advisors throughout 2017.



SIG TAU MARKETPLACE LAUNCHED

Since its launch on November 26, Sig Tau Marketplace has seen a substantial uptick in both traffic and sales as compared to the previous Sig Tau Store. Since its launch, the Marketplace website has generated over \$15,000 in revenue and welcomed 2,780 unique visitors. In 2017, we are committed to providing brand-new products for sale on this platform.

Another component of the new Sig Tau Marketplace platform is its ability to easily convert to a pop-up shop when needed. During this year's Webb Academy, we set up a dedicated room for the Marketplace and offered all of our items for sale to attendees during registration, breaks, and meals. Over the weekend, 192 orders generated \$3,750 in revenue. This marks our highest revenue weekend from any store we have run in the past.



UPDATED ASSOCIATE PIN AND **MEMBERSHIP BADGE RELEASED**

During the 47th Grand Chapter in Orlando, Florida, delegates approved a change to both the associate pin and member badge to align with our new branding. Throughout the fall semester, HQ Staff has been working with Herff Jones to finalize renderings and move into production. To the excitement of our members, the associate pin and badge were both introduced at Webb Academy. Badges were distributed to each chapter for their fall semester initiates and spring initiation goals set at Webb Academy. Chapters also received a set of associate pins to remain in possession of the chapter for their future new member classes. The new badge and associate pin will be available for purchase in the Sig Tau Marketplace in the summer of 2017.



NATIONAL WEBSITE LAUNCHED

On March 16, the new sigtau.org was publicly launched. HQ sent out an email to everyone in our database, encouraging them to visit the site, along with posting a graphic developed by Creative Director Jeremy Harrington on our social media platforms. Our Facebook post reached more than 10,000 people. The new site includes more than 160 pages of content, with a new calendar, Foundation and WPN pages, and a history page complete with a timeline. Additional enhancements will be ongoing.





WEBSITE WINS NATIONAL AWARD

Graphic Design USA has been a graphic design information source since 1963, working with thousands of graphic design professionals every year. Sigtau.org received the annual American Web Design Award, given out by Graphic Design USA in conjunction with The Creative Group. This honor highlights how the power of design can enhance the online experience. The group received more than 1,400 applications, so Sig Tau's award is a tremendous accomplishment.



SPRING 2017 EXPANSION RECAP

This past spring, Sigma Tau Gamma expanded to four (4) new campuses, which brought in 80 new Founding Fathers. These expansion projects include the University of Nevada (Zeta Lambda), the University of California, Merced (Zeta Rho), Colorado State University (Zeta Sigma), and the Alpha Epsilon Chapter was restarted at Henderson State University. With these new expansion projects, Sig Tau now calls 76 campuses and 30 states home.

ALABAMA CHAPTER TRANSFERS **FUNDS TO WPN INVESTMENT** ACCOUNT

The Epsilon Phi Chapter has voted to transfer \$90,000 to the WPN Investment Fund. Funds received will be invested in the National Bank of Indianapolis Diamond Capital Management account. The chapter will determine each December and April if additional funds can be transferred based on the balance in their operating budget. This is money that the chapter has been saving for a house since their founding which will now be invested for future use.



WPN GENERAL COUNSEL APPOINTED

Tom Harris, Pittsburg State '79, has been appointed as the General Counsel by CEO Steve Latour on behalf of the WPN Housing Company. Tom will serve WPN through June 2018. Tom earned his J.D. from the University of Kansas in 1986 and is licensed to practice in both Kansas and Missouri. Since that time. Tom has specialized in contract negotiation and preparation, commercial collections, business and real estate litigation, estate planning, probate administration, trust administration, tax planning, real estate development, bankruptcy procedures and litigation, insurance defense, and government compliance. Once the Fraternity's General Counsel position is filled, all three entities will have a volunteer serving in that role. WPN BOARD OF MANAGERS MEETING

The first face-to-face meeting of the WPN Board of Managers took place on April 29 in Warrensburg, Missouri. The Board of Managers received a tour of the 101 Ming property and heard reports from HO Staff regarding current and future fiscal year operations and finances. They voted to approve the FY18 budget, defined the board's role, and selected members to represent WPN on the Investment and Audit Committees, in addition to getting an update on the Fraternity, Foundation, and WPN priorities through 2020. The Board of Managers discussed topics concerning the purchase of properties and alumni investment opportunities. The next WPN Board of Managers meeting is a conference call scheduled for August 17.



Undergraduates Sam Willoh, Missouri, and K. Seth Lee, Southeastern Louisiana, participated in a Capitol Hill visit with more than 250 fraternity and sorority leaders on April 26. They met with members of Congress and their legislative staffs asking them to support the Collegiate Housing and Infrastructure Act (CHIA) which makes college more affordable for students, creates thousands of small business jobs nationwide, improves campus safety, and reduces long-term student debt. This is the first time Sigma Tau Gamma has participated in the annual hill visits coordinated by the Fraternal Government Relations Coalition (FGRC). Here is some additional information about the PAC.

HOW HAS THE FRATERNITY AND SORORITY POLITICAL ACTION COMMITTEE (FSPAC) MADE A **DIFFERENCE?**

More than \$600,000 was raised by the FSPAC in the 2015-2016 cycle, making it the best fundraising cycle to date.

Funding from the FSPAC went to 109 candidates in the last election. 91 percent of those candidates won their elections and now serve in the 115th Congress.

One hundred and thirty-five members of Congress are also members of fraternities and sororities, including several members of our fine Fraternity.

WHAT WORK NEEDS TO BE DONE?

Advocacy for the policy agenda items that impact the future of the fraternity and sorority experience. Preservation of our single-sex status, protection of freedom of association, and due process rights for individuals and organizations.

Passage of the Collegiate Housing and Infrastructure Act (CHIA) that will allow tax-deductible contributions to existing educational foundations. These contributions would help to provide safe and affordable housing facilities for fraternities and sororities.

Continued collaboration with Congress as they tackle tax reform and higher education issues; both have a significant impact on the fraternity and sorority experience.

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Sigma Tau Gamma's 47th Grand Chapter took place in Orlando, Florida, June 16-18 of 2016. Awards were given out, new legislation was passed, and brothers gathered to create lasting memories. The event was the largest Grand Chapter to date, with nearly 500 brothers and guests in attendance. This Grand Chapter is one that will be forever in the history books, with many new changes approved.

The Fraternity has modified the badge and shield, has established a new seal and associate member pin, and has slightly modified the Coat-of-Arms. These changes were released during the 2016-2017 academic year.

A NOBLE JOURNEY

Since 1920, Sigma Tau Gamma has endeavored to bring forth a brotherhood of noble gentlemen. Fostering generations of men to live and lead based on our Six Principles. These principles of Learning, Integrity, Excellence, Leadership, Citizenship and Brotherhood have successfully guided not only our individual brothers but also the organization as a whole. In so doing, we have developed into a strong, solid brotherhood on campus and a dedicated and passionate alumni group off campus. And it was with these men (and those to come) in mind that leadership, in the Fraternity's 95th year, decided to embark on a comprehensive

rebrand, as a means of honoring the organization's history while solidifying it for the future.

Guided by the vision of our Founders, we began the rebrand with determination to preserve their dream. Together with our creative partners at Rhyme & Reason Design, we spent the initial

phase of the project immersing ourselves in the heritage of yesterday and the conversations of today. Our new CEO, Steve Latour, personally visited chapters to better understand the current tone of the organization and learn where improvements could be made. Additionally, focus groups were held at conventions and headquarters to capture perceptions and drill deeper into the strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats affecting the brotherhood across campuses and across the country.

IMMERSING OURSELVES IN OUR PAST. PRESENT, AND FUTURE

Through research, we discovered there was a strong consensus for a rebrand and an overarching desire to shed the stereotype of "frat boys" in favor of a focus on being seen as a diverse set of honorable, noble gentlemen. There were also multiple references to a lack of consistency in messaging and a lack of clarity among sub-brands. Beyond messaging discrepancies there were concerns around the size of the organization on campus, as well as within the alumni network, and a few less-than-stellar impressions of the headquarters.

> The results, though at times disheartening, were what we needed to hear and see to ensure we were taking the right steps to not simply rebrand, but reinspire and reinvigorate the entire brotherhood. Armed with the good, the bad, and the ugly, we pushed forward into phase two — the development and introduction of the national mark.

HISTORY

After nearly a year of development, the Fraternity launched the Sig Tau Marketplace in November 2016. The purpose of the online store is to offer our members a variety of products that could be used for recruitment, ritual, or even as gifts. Members have requested for years that the Fraternity carry additional products that would help them market the Fraternity on their campus.

In the past ten years, nearly all of the national fraternities and sororities have established an online store and have even expanded their store to include a physical store in their Headquarters. Previously members could buy a few select items or would need to find a local vendor or a licensed vendor online. With the Marketplace, all of that information is now in one location online and easily accessible.



He and an existing member of the Ball State Chapter went to high school together. At one point in their high school career, Young was being bullied and this other member stuck up for him. Even before they were Fraternity brothers, the two shared a brotherly bond.

While Young was still in high school, he had a passion for writing. He remembered that some of his assigned essays were requested to be read aloud because the teacher thought his work was of high quality. As good as his essays were though, his teachers never really encouraged him to pursue a career in writing. "I kind of had these idealistic notions that teachers would really encourage me to follow my dreams. It didn't work out like that, but I kept a journal throughout high school anyway," Young said.

When he was in his late twenties. Young took a correspondence class in writing magazine articles at the University of Wisconsin. The first When God closes assignment was writing a door, he opens a nostalgia article in which Young chose to write about the novel

hero Frank Merriwell.

His instructor was so impressed with the work, he encouraged Young to send it to some publications. Amazingly, the first one that he sent it to bought it. Young had found similar success with other lessons, and it was then he knew that it was something that he wanted to pursue.

When asked about doing what he loved for a living, Young responded "Yes, that's kind of been my main objective. I never deluded myself into thinking that I had some great message to share with the world, but I also liked it because it gave me a lot of autonomy. When you get these book writing assignments, the editors don't care where you work, or when you come to work, just that you meet your deadline and get it to them in time and the format that they want."

Over the course of his career, Jeff Young has had an outstanding 44 books published. When his very first book was published, Jeff said that it was like a dream come true. Upon receiving the complimentary copy from the editor, he said it was a magical feeling just holding the finished product in his hand and seeing his name on the front cover and on the spine. He compared the feeling to climbing a mountain. "It's a long hard journey, but once

you reach the summit, the view is splendid,"

When asked what book he is most proud of. Young responded, "I'm very proud of that in the way a first book is almost like a first-born child. You try not to play favorites but you do."

This book, Fathers of American Presidents, was groundbreaking in that never before had a book been written about the fathers of presidents. He originally thought about just writing an article on George Washington's father, and he was going to call it "The Father of the Father of our Country." Once he got started on the article, he thought why not just do one for every father, and that's how the book came about.

Aside from having 44 books published over his career, Young says one of his biggest accomplishments was receiving the Spur

> Award for his books Bleeding Kansas and the Violent Clash over Slavery in the Heartland. This award is given by the Western Writers of America

and considered one of the most prestigious awards in American literature.

Although Young has never written about his Fraternity experience, he has had a piece published in a previous SAGA Magazine. The article tells of a fateful day in Young's life where brotherhood was fully exemplified.

In 1983 Young lost one of his best friends, **Jeff Gorham**, in a tragic car accident while in Georgia fulfilling his duties for the Air Force Reserves. Young and Gorham both grew up in the same small town of Lebanon, Indiana and were the best of friends since the summer between their second and third grade years. The loss of a close friend is never an easy time on someone's life, but even so, life has a funny way of working.

Young was on his way back from Gorham's funeral and stopped in a library to make a copy of the obituary that was in a Georgia newspaper. After leaving, Young couldn't remember where he had parked his car and found himself aimlessly walking through the big, unfamiliar city when something peculiar happened. A man approached Young that he didn't recognize, until the man called Young by his college nickname, "Rufus."

PUBLISHED BY JEFF YOUNG

Jeff C. Young was born in Orangeburg, South Carolina but he spent his formative years in Lebanon, Indiana. Since graduating from Ball State University in 1971, Young has worked as an editor, journalist, freelance writer, and librarian. When he was between writing. editing, or librarian jobs, Young delivered pizzas in four different decades. In 1997, he became a published author with the debut of his book The Fathers of American Presidents. Since then, he has written over 40 nonfiction books for young readers in the fields of biography, sports, politics/government, military history, Young's book, Bleeding Kansas and the Violent Clash Over Slavery In The Heartland, won the prestigious Spur Award from the Western Writers of America for Best Juvenile Nonfiction Book. Young currently works as the Director of the **Learning Resource**

Center at Meridian

College in Sarasota,

Florida

The man was Frank Petrella, Ball State. Frank was the President of the Omicron Chapter at Ball State at the same time that Young was an associate member of Sigma Tau Gamma. Having both been US History majors, Young and Petrella were close friends until Petrella graduated in 1970.

"It was just kind of unreal because the only reason I was in that place at that time was because of the death of my closest friend. It's just one of those inexplicable things that happen in your life. It was like the expression 'When God closes a door, he opens a window.' I lost one close friend and because of that I reconnected with another. I had that 13-year hiatus where I never saw him until that day in Atlanta. After that we stayed in touch until he passed away in 2001," Young said.

You truly never know the people you will meet or the relationships you will form as a member of Sigma Tau Gamma. You may not see your brothers for years, but that will never take away that initial bond that was formed as active members. Brotherhood goes far beyond your undergraduate years. Brotherhood is eternal, as exemplified by that fateful day in Atlanta. 🔨

As winter storm Jupiter made its way across the country and had sights set on Missouri, over 200 undergraduate men and 17 alumni facilitators gathered for the 22nd annual Earl A. Webb Academy at the Kansas City Marriott Downtown.

This year's Academy saw the additions of the Director of Finance and Operations Track, as well as the Director of Recruitment Track and President Track. Executive Cabinet officers participated in structured curriculum around their specific positions and large group sessions highlighting the Sig Tau Foundation, McCune Awards process, Endeavor Minneapolis, and inspiring messages from the Fraternity's CEO, Steve Latour, and keynote speaker Aaron Boe.

The inaugural Director of Finance and Operations curriculum track featured four alumni facilitators; two HQ Staff members; Heather McLeod, Director of National Services at OmegaFi; and Russell Citron, Founder and CEO of CrowdChange, a fundraising platform used by chapters.

Chapters were challenged to look at their current expenses, income, overall budgets, and financial reality.

FROM THE When the war emerged in the early 1940s, there were Sig Taus in the fight on every front, from Pearl Harbor to Tokyo.

No matter the restraints or challenges faced, more than three thousand members of the Fraternity left their homes and families to do the job they were assigned.

Unlike the previous demands of war, World War II required a new standard of technical training and intangible skills. It needed men with experience and higher education to serve as leaders for what was being undertaken. Due to these circumstances, college men were in great demand. A large segment of several chapters enlisted together across many different branches of service.

Under the service of their faculty advisor, Captain James Hutchinson, members of the Upsilon Chapter saw service together at Dutch Harbor. At the home of the Chi Chapter at Western Michigan University, there were as many as sixty members from ten chapters of the Fraternity who trained together. It would not be uncommon for members to transfer their membership to the local chapter for the duration of their stay. This type of altruistic behavior contributed to the preservation of several chapters during the war.
